1. (20 points)

(a) Compute $\int \frac{x}{\sqrt{x^2+1}} dx$

$$u = x^2 + 1 \quad du = 2x dx \quad dx = \frac{du}{2x}$$

$$= \int \frac{\cancel{x}}{\sqrt{u}} \frac{du}{2\cancel{x}} = \frac{1}{2} \int \frac{du}{\sqrt{u}} = \frac{1}{2} \cdot 2\sqrt{u} + C = \sqrt{x^2+1} + C$$

(b) Compute $\int x^{3/2} \ln x dx$

$$u = \ln x \quad dv = x^{3/2} dx$$
$$du = \frac{1}{x} dx \quad v = \frac{2x^{5/2}}{5}$$

$$= \frac{2x^{5/2}}{5} \ln x - \int \frac{2}{5} \frac{1}{\cancel{x}} x^{\cancel{3/2}} dx$$

$$= \frac{2}{5} x^{5/2} \ln x - \frac{2}{5} \cdot \frac{2}{5} x^{5/2}$$

$$= \frac{2}{5} x^{5/2} \ln x - \frac{4}{25} x^{5/2} + C$$

2. (20 points)

(a) Compute $\int \sin^4(4x) \cos^3(4x) dx$

$$u = \sin(4x) \quad du = 4 \cos(4x) dx$$
$$dx = \frac{du}{4 \cos(4x)}$$

$$= \int u^4 \cos^{\cancel{3}^2}(4x) \frac{du}{\cancel{4 \cos(4x)}} = \frac{1}{4} \int u^4 (1 - u^2) du$$

$$= \frac{1}{4} \int u^4 - u^6 du = \frac{1}{4} \left[\frac{u^5}{5} - \frac{u^7}{7} \right]$$
$$= \frac{1}{4} \left[\frac{\sin^5(4x)}{5} - \frac{\sin^7(4x)}{7} \right] + C$$

(b) Compute $\int e^x \tan^2(e^x) \sec^4(e^x) dx$

$$u = e^x \quad du = e^x dx$$

$$= \int \tan^2 u \sec^4 u du$$

$$k = \tan u$$
$$dk = \sec^2 u du$$

$$= \int k^2 \sec^{\cancel{4}^2} u \frac{dk}{\cancel{\sec^2 u}}$$

$$du = \frac{dk}{\sec^2 u}$$

$$= \int k^2 (k^2 + 1) dk = \int k^4 + k^2 dk$$

$$= \frac{k^5}{5} + \frac{k^3}{3} = \frac{\tan^5(e^x)}{5} + \frac{\tan^3(e^x)}{3} + C$$

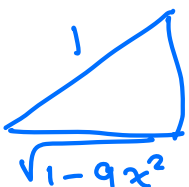
3. (20 points)

(a) Compute $\int \frac{1}{x^2 \sqrt{1-9x^2}} dx$

$$x = \frac{\sin \theta}{3}$$

$$dx = \frac{\cos \theta}{3} d\theta$$

$$= \int \frac{\frac{\cancel{\cos \theta}}{3}}{\frac{\sin^2 \theta}{9} \sqrt{1 - \cancel{\sin^2 \theta}}} d\theta = 3 \int \csc^2 \theta d\theta$$

$$= -3 \cot \theta$$


$$= -3 \frac{\sqrt{1-9x^2}}{3x}$$

$$- \frac{\sqrt{1-9x^2}}{x} + C$$

(b) Compute $\int \operatorname{arcsinh}(2x) dx$

$$u = \operatorname{ARCSINH} 2x \quad dv = dx$$

$$du = \frac{2}{\sqrt{4x^2+1}} dx \quad v = x$$

$$= x \operatorname{ARCSINH} 2x - \int \frac{2x}{\sqrt{4x^2+1}} dx$$

$$u = 4x^2 + 1$$

$$du = 8x dx$$

$$dx = \frac{du}{8x}$$

$$= x \operatorname{ARCSINH} 2x - \frac{1}{2} \sqrt{4x^2+1} + C$$

4. (20 points)

(a) (10 points) $\int \frac{5x+3}{(x-1)(x+2)(x+3)} dx$

$$\frac{5x+3}{(x-1)(x+2)(x+3)} = \frac{A}{x-1} + \frac{B}{x+2} + \frac{C}{x+3}$$

$$5x+3 = A(x+2)(x+3) + B(x-1)(x+3) + C(x-1)(x+2)$$

$$\begin{aligned} x=1 \\ 8 &= 12A \\ A &= \frac{2}{3} \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} x=-2 \\ -7 &= -3B \\ B &= \frac{7}{3} \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned} x=-3 \\ -12 &= 4C \\ C &= -3 \end{aligned}$$

$$= \int \frac{\frac{2}{3}}{x-1} + \frac{\frac{7}{3}}{x+2} + \frac{-3}{x+3} dx = \frac{2}{3} \ln|x-1| + \frac{7}{3} \ln|x+2| - 3 \ln|x+3| + C$$

(b) (10 points) $\int \frac{\sin x}{\cos^2 x + \cos x - 2} dx$

$$u = \cos x$$

$$du = -\sin x dx$$

$$= -\int \frac{1}{u^2+u-2} du$$

$$\frac{1}{(u+2)(u-1)} = \frac{A}{u+2} + \frac{B}{u-1} = \frac{A(u-1) + B(u+2)}{(u+2)(u-1)}$$

$$\begin{aligned} u=-2 \quad 1 &= -3A \\ A &= -\frac{1}{3} \end{aligned}$$

$$= -\int \frac{-\frac{1}{3}}{u+2} + \frac{\frac{1}{3}}{u-1} du$$

$$\begin{aligned} u=1 \quad 1 &= 3B \\ B &= \frac{1}{3} \end{aligned}$$

$$\frac{1}{3} \left[\ln|\cos x + 2| - \ln|\cos x - 1| \right] + C$$

5. (20 points)

(a) Compute $\int_1^{\infty} \frac{4 \arctan x}{(x^2 + 1)} dx$

$$u = \arctan x$$

$$du = \frac{1}{x^2 + 1} dx$$

$$= \int \frac{4u \cancel{(x^2+1)}}{\cancel{(x^2+1)}} dx = 2u^2 = 2(\arctan x)^2 \Big|_1^{\infty}$$

$$= 2 \left[\frac{\pi^2}{2} - \left(\frac{\pi}{4} \right)^2 \right] = 2 \left[\frac{3\pi^2}{8} \right] = \frac{3\pi^2}{4}$$

(b) Use the chart below and Simpson's method with $n = 4$ sub-intervals to approximate the integral

$$\int_0^4 \frac{1}{x^2 + 1} dx$$

x	$f(x)$	M.F.	P
0	1	1	1
1	$\frac{1}{2}$	4	2
2	$\frac{1}{5}$	2	$\frac{2}{5}$
3	$\frac{1}{10}$	4	$\frac{2}{5}$
4	$\frac{1}{17}$	1	$\frac{1}{17}$

$$\sin^2 \theta + \cos^2 \theta = 1$$

$$\tan^2 \theta + 1 = \sec^2 \theta$$

$$1 + \cot^2 \theta = \csc^2 \theta$$

$$\sin(\alpha + \beta) = \sin \alpha \cos \beta + \cos \alpha \sin \beta$$

$$\sin(\alpha - \beta) = \sin \alpha \cos \beta - \cos \alpha \sin \beta$$

$$\cos(\alpha + \beta) = \cos \alpha \cos \beta - \sin \alpha \sin \beta$$
