What is Medical Anthropology?

The concentration in medical anthropology offers a holistic, biocultural approach to health and disease. The program is taught by anthropology faculty who specialize in state-of-the-art research and teaching within the field of medical anthropology.

Through a cross-cultural approach, students become knowledgeable about sociocultural, biological, psychological, linguistic, and historical processes which shape illness experience, patterns of disease and health behavior, access to health care services, and professional medical constructions of disease and medical care. The health science concentration also trains students in ethnographic and statistical methods for analyzing and conducting clinically-relevant research.

Why Emphasize in Medical Anthropology?

The medical anthropology concentration provides students with the necessary background and skills for further study in medicine, nursing, public health, and the social sciences. By learning about the experience of health and illness from patients' points of view, students develop valuable clinical and cultural skills of direct relevance to practice in the health sciences.

This area of study also helps students develop their skills for critical thinking, essential to the analysis and interpretation of biomedical knowledge. With the rapid increase of cultural diversity among patient populations, the cross-cultural perspective which students gain through this anthropology program may be crucial to knowledge and clinical practice in the twenty-first century.
