Welcome to the seventh Newsletter from the Center for Social Science Research on AIDS (CeSSRA), a collaborative training and research center, with collaborators from Case Western Reserve University, Makerere University, the Joint Clinical Research Centre, and Mbarara University of Science and Technology, SABRES/IDI/SPH, among others. The CeSSRA office is always open Monday to Friday 8am to 5pm. It is located in Seminar Room 7 in the Faculty of Social Sciences, Makerere University main campus.

The center's aim is to train social scientists to carry out social science research on HIV/AIDS collaboratively and also conduct a longitudinal study on the social context of HIV/AIDS treatment. Under the fellowship component, the Fellows are reviewing their individual mentoring plans and are concretizing their areas of research interest. They are currently participating in an ongoing research design course. Fellows continuously receive free-critique as they present their research work. This will enable them publish papers in scientific journals and prepare grantable proposals.

PUBLIC LECTURE:

As a part of the ongoing "AIDS 201" public lecture series, CeSSRA has invited **Mr. Matovu Joseph to give a talk on 6th March 2009 in Lecture Room 2 in Faculty of Social Sciences from 1pm to 2pm.** His talk is titled: **"The Changing Face of Uganda's HIV/AIDS Epidemic: A Case of Behaviour Complacency?"**

Mr. Matovu holds a Masters of Health Sciences degree in International Health from the John Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health in the US. He is an accomplished behavioral scientist with a strong research interest in behavioral change communication (BCC) for HIV/AIDS.

PROFILES

Katushabe Juliet

This month we are featuring a profile of one of our research fellows Katushabe Juliet

Juliet holds BA, Social Sciences, Makerere University; MA, Sociology, Makerere University. She is currently working as a Program Assistant in the Ministry of Health, and trains HIV counselors. She also focuses on PMTCT (Prevention of Mother to Child Transmission), working to train midwives to do counseling and testing.

Katushabe has worked as a team leader for research projects and was a program officer for the legal clinic. She is interested in knowledge and attitudes of the use of PMTCT. There is a high rate of acceptance of prenatal testing but some women refuse to accept parts of the package that is provided. Specifically the package includes bed nets and jerry cans. Women may accept the net because it is small but not jerry can as it is too large to hide and serves as a label that they were tested. She feels there is more research needed on women's experiences with HIV, particularly what women go through with issues of disclosure and breastfeeding.

She seeks to get a PhD in Sociology or Medical Anthropology to work in either academics or on projects.

Dr. Janet Seeley is currently seconded to the MRC/UVRI Uganda Research Unit on AIDS from the University of East Anglia where she is a senior lecturer in Gender and Development at the School of Development Studies. She holds a PhD in social anthropology from the University of Cambridge (1985). She has been actively engaged in research on HIV and AIDS since the late 1980s, including four years with MRC in Uganda 1989-1993 as Senior Social Anthropologist, leading the establishment of the social science research in the Unit. Her other research interests include: chronic poverty and social protection, internal migration, the application of livelihood and gender analysis to development. She has undertaken long term research in Kenya, Zambia, Nepal, Bangladesh and India as well as Uganda.
