Cheryl Toman, Ruth Mulhauser Professor, Modern Languages and Literatures

Awarded the Ordre des Palmes académiques (French for "Order of Academic Palms"), a national order bestowed by the French Republic to distinguished academics and figures in the world of culture and education. Non-French citizens receive such a distinction for actively contributing throughout their career to the promotion of French culture. Named at the second highest level possible, "officier," one of the rare scholars to have bypassed entirely the recognition of "chevalier," usually required for promotion to "officier" status. Nominations and promotions are decided by the Minister of National Education. Originally established in 1808 by Emperor Napoleon as a decoration to honor eminent members of the University of Paris, it was changed into its current form as an order of merit on 4 October 1955 by President René Coty.

Timothy Wutrich, Senior Instructor, Classics
